Palm Sunday Traditions...New and Old

Our Church School children love having their palms and processing with the Choir and congregation. Their faces show it all. As the adults go into the Nave to hear the Passion our church school children go into Miss Betty-Jeanne's classroom to hear the story of Benjamin's Box (a walk through Holy Week designed for children). As the children receive donkey hair, nails, dice, cloth they learn what our Lord went through from Maundy Thursday to Easter with the Resurrection.

This year we had a very special guest, **Rob Burton** joined our class and after the reading showed our children how to make palm crosses. Palm crosses are so much better for this age and the children were thrilled to be able to take home their palm cross. Many thanks for Rob showing our children how to do this and for making each child their own palm cross.

Our older children in Miss Leslie's class had their own version of Benjamin's box. She placed in plastic eggs donkey hair, nails, dice, cloth, stone and hid the first 5 eggs outside by the children's garden. After they found the eggs she asked each child to open their egg (in order of the story) and then read from the book why this object was important. Thanks to **Leslie Burton** a new tradition starts.

















Tenebrae – **Latin** meaning *darkness*

A new beginning has been born at Epiphany, as 48 people joined Father Rick for our first Tenebrae Service. A solemn and serene mood was set as the service commenced in virtual darkness, with the only light cast from nine candles burning on the Altar, eight black candles flanking one white. After each of the service's readings, one black candle was extinguished.

The service began with the Epiphany choir singing "Abba." The Betrayal of Jesus is recounted, as darkness draws nearer with each candle snuffed. Nearer with Peter's denial at the Last Supper. Darker still as the service turns to the Garden of Gethsemane, where our Lord asked Peter, James, and John to "wait with me one hour." Our choir then sang "Wait With Me."

Judas betrays Jesus. He is arrested, and the Nave grows darker still. Peter denies Jesus three times and another light perishes. Pilate asks who Jesus is, if he is King of the Jews, and the gloaming creeps nearer. The crowd shouts for Barabbas to be spared and shriek "Crucify Him!" Another flame smothered.

The Epiphany choir then performed "My Dying Lord." We hear soldiers mock Jesus on the cross, and the darkness has now nearly consumed the light.

"Father, Forgive Them" was then sung by the Choir. Christ is buried. The final candle, the white Christ candle, is put out. Total and complete darkness has fallen across the Nave.

A "BANG!" pierces the stillness of eternal night. The tomb is closed.

The Congregation sits in the all surrounding blackness, the representation of Christ in the tomb. In silent contemplation, the congregants exit the Nave and the service is concluded.





The children in Miss Betty-Jeanne's class learn about Jesus' friend Lazarus and how important friends are to us and to God. Although each and every year they think Lazarus looks like a walking mummy. The following week they hear Benjamin's Box so they learn again that death really doesn't exist for us but eternal life.



Giving them a stable place to live and showing them the love and caring of the community is a huge opportunity and a great blessing for Epiphany. Epiphany is being called to be a beacon to our community as we grow. We show it in our actions, by working together and helping others.
